# CAMPUS SECURITY AND SAFETY

This report was prepared by the Colorado School of Mines Police Department in order to comply with the Clery Act (formerly known as the Federal Student Right-to-Know and Campus Security Act of 1990). The report describes security practices and procedures at the Colorado School of Mines and lists crime statistics for the most recent calendar year and the two preceding calendar years. The Colorado School of Mines is required to report each year on the status of campus security to all current students and employees. The report will be provided to any applicant for enrollment or employment on request.

This publication is intended to provide a general description of campus security arrangements, and not to serve as a contractual agreement between CSM and the recipient. Security procedures are subject to change without notice.

## DEFINITION OF CAMPUS

The term "campus" means:

- 1 Any building or property owned or controlled by this institution of higher education within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls, and fraternity, or sorority houses located within the campus boundaries
- 2 Property within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or other retail vendor).
- 3 The Colorado School of Mines Campus is defined as those properties, streets, retail operations and facilities owned by the State of Colorado and used by students, staff, faculty and visitors.

## DEFINITION OF NON-CAMPUS

The term "non campus building or property" means:

- 1 Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization recognized by the institution; and
- 2 Any building or property (other than a branch campus) owned or controlled by an institution of higher education that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.



## DEFINITION OF PUBLIC PROPERTY

The term "public property" means all public property that is within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution, such as a sidewalk, a street, other thoroughfare, or parking facility, and is adjacent to a facility owned or controlled by the institution if the facility is used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to the institution's educational purposes.

## STATUS OF CAMPUS SAFETY

Although located in an urban environment, the Colorado School of Mines Campus has one of the lowest campus crime rates in the state. This report includes crime rates for the campus proper along with any building or property owned or controlled by the institution within the same contiguous geographic area of the institution. State crime statistics can be found in the Colorado Department of Public Safety's annual report entitled "Crime in Colorado".

## REPORTING CRIMES AND EMERGENCIES

Crime reports can be made at any time. Colorado School of Mines Police Department services are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Priority is given to reports of incidents that threaten the life or safety of people, the security of property and the peace of the community.

Colorado Revised Statutes, 18-8-115, "Duty to Report a Crime", requires all persons who believe a crime has been committed to promptly report the suspected crime to law enforcement authorities. **When on campus, these crimes must be reported to the Colorado School of Mines Police Department.** To report a crime, use any one of the blue emergency telephones located through-out campus or one of the emergency phones located throughout campus in all of the academic buildings; for immediate, direct access call **911** from any phone for emergencies; or call 303-273-3333 for other police assistance.

Call the Colorado School of Mines Police Department if:

- ❖ You need to report a crime
- ❖ Someone is injured or ill
- ❖ You see fire or smell smoke or see a chemical spill
- ❖ You see anyone or anything suspicious
- ❖ You see someone stealing something
- ❖ You think you see a drunk driver



In addition, victims of stalkers or persons with restraining orders against another party are strongly encouraged to notify the Colorado School of Mines Police Department of the threat and to provide the Police Department with a copy of the restraining order so that campus officers may enforce it.

Additionally, a "Clery Act Statistic Report Form" is available to any campus official who is designated as a campus security authority (includes the following: deans, student housing staff, athletic coaches, student activities coordinators, student judicial officers, and faculty advisors to student organizations) to complete as they become aware of a crime and the victim wishes to remain anonymous.

\*\* Colorado School of Mines Police Department encourages professional and pastoral counselors, although not required to report crimes, to tell victims about the Confidential Reporting Process.

## **NOTIFYING CAMPUS OF CRIMINAL ACTIVITY**

Timely advisories are made to the campus community on crimes that are reported to Colorado School of Mines Police Department or local police and may be considered a threat to other students or employees. These reports are made using one or a combination of the following methods:

## **LAW ENFORCEMENT AUTHORITY AND INTER-AGENCY RELATIONSHIPS**

The police officers in the Colorado School of Mines Police Department receive their police authority via the provisions of the Colorado Revised Statutes, Title 24, Article 7, Part 1. The Colorado School of Mines Board of Trustees, through the University President and the Vice-President of Student Life, has delegated authority to the Colorado School of Mines Police Department to enforce campus rules and regulations as well as Municipal Ordinances, State Laws and Federal Statutes. Colorado School of Mines Police Department officers have full police authority and are certified police officers as defined under Colorado Revised Statutes.



The Colorado School of Mines Police officers work closely with the Golden Police Department and the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office through inter-agency agreements in order to provide the students, staff, and faculty with the most thorough coverage and services possible.

## **COLORADO SCHOOL OF MINES POLICE DEPARTMENT**

The Colorado School of Mines Department of Public Safety is a full service, community oriented law enforcement agency, providing service to the campus 24/7. It is the mission of the department to provide an environment in which all people feel safe and secure, and to maintain a professional workforce that is responsive to the community and accountable for the most effective use of resources. The department is responsible for providing services such as:

- ❖ Proactive patrol of the campus and its facilities;
- ❖ Investigation and reporting of crimes and incidents;
- ❖ Motor vehicle traffic and parking enforcement;
- ❖ Crime and security awareness programs;
- ❖ Alcohol & drug abuse awareness / education;
- ❖ Self defense classes;
- ❖ Consultation with campus departments for safety and security matters;
- ❖ Additional services to the campus community such as: vehicle unlocks and jumpstarts, community safe walks (escorts), authorized after-hours building and office access, motor vehicle registration, and assistance in any medical, fire, or other emergency situation.

The police officers employed by the Department of Public Safety are fully trained officers in accordance with the Peace Officer Standards and Training (P.O.S.T.) Board and Colorado Revised Statutes.

The Department of Public Safety is located at 1812 Illinois Street, on the north-west corner of the intersection of 19th Street and Illinois. The administrative office hours are Monday – Friday 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. The office phone number is (303) 273-3333. After office hours, an on-duty officer may be reached through the same number or via the Golden Police Department dispatch directly at (303) 384-8045. ## SECURITY AWARENESS AND CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMS

A community and its police must do more than simply react to crime. It is important to look for opportunities to deter and/or prevent crime. Colorado School of Mines Police Department provides services and programs to improve safety on campus and to make the community aware of campus crime. In an effort to reduce criminal activity, as well as to minimize their chances of becoming a victim, CSM Police provide the following programs.

## **ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES**

Established facility hours are coordinated and maintained by the Facilities Management Department. The CSM Police Department also works closely with the Facilities Management Department to maintain building security and key control. Access to facilities after normal building hours is limited and coordinated between the Police Department and the department wishing to grant access. After hours access may not be granted without prior written notice.

## **ALCOHOL AND DRUG POLICY**

### **ALCOHOL POLICY**

*Colorado School of Mines Alcohol Policy Summary:*

21 is the legal drinking age

Registration of all student events

Non-Alcoholic beverages and food provided

Unlicensed selling of alcohol prohibited

Must use a licensed third party vendor

## **INTRODUCTION**

The Colorado School of Mines Board of Trustees has adopted an alcohol use policy in keeping with state and local laws governing the use, distribution, and consumption of alcohol. The University is committed to responsible behavior and as such, the alcohol policy is designed to encourage responsible drinking and behavior. Violation of this policy may result in disciplinary action. For the purpose of this policy, alcoholic beverages are referred to as beer and wine only with a maximum alcohol content of 6%.

The Student Development Center, the Health Center, Student Life Staff, and the Vice President for Student Life/Dean of Students Office will provide information or counseling in the physiological, psychological and legal aspects of alcohol use.

## **THE LAW**

Colorado law prohibits consumption of alcoholic beverages for people under age 21. Furthermore, social host liability may be imposed on persons serving or permitting the serving of alcohol to minors, visibly intoxicated persons, or habitual drinkers.



## **PURCHASE**

The Ben H. Parker Student Center is the only area on campus where alcoholic beverages are licensed to be sold. Any attempt to sell alcoholic beverages without authorization and licensing violates Colorado State liquor code and is also subject to College disciplinary action. To obtain a special event liquor license, meet with the Director of Student Activities a minimum of 60 days prior to the event.

## **THIRD PARTY VENDOR**

All alcohol that is served at events must be served by a licensed third-party vendor. The vendor is responsible for the sale, distribution, service, and transportation of the alcohol as well as checking IDs to verify age requirements. Please contact the Student Activities Office for a list of acceptable vendors.

## **LOCATION**

Student organizations wishing to hold a function at which alcoholic beverages will be served in any campus facilities or on campus grounds must receive prior approval by the Director of Student Activities.

**Student Residence Halls** – No alcoholic beverages may be consumed in individual rooms of the residence halls or in any public areas of the residence halls.

**Fraternity and Sorority Houses** - Alcoholic beverages may be consumed by those of legal age only as approved by IFC, Pan-Hellenic, the Director of Student Activities and chapter rules. All events at which alcoholic beverages are served must be approved by the Director of Student Activities and use a third-party vendor.

**Off Campus** - Student organizations wishing to hold a function where alcoholic beverages may be consumed by those of legal age only must be approved by the Director of Student Activities and use a third party vendor.

## **PROCEDURES**

1. Organizations wishing to have a function must contact the Student Activities Office to obtain a Request to Serve Alcohol at a Student Event Form and return it to Student Activities a minimum of one week prior to the event.
2. Before alcohol will be allowed at an event, the form must be completed and approved in accordance with all aspects of the Alcohol Policy.



3. All extra permits, (open container, special license, street closure, bonfire, etc.) where applicable, must be attached before approval.
4. A member of the organization must attend an alcohol education workshop, which covers policy alcohol education, and details for getting event approval.
5. If at any time during your event you have problems, call Public Safety immediately. They may choose to remove individuals, take them to the Detox Center or arrest them. Public Safety (303) 273-3333 or **911**.

## **ILLEGAL DRUG POLICY**

*Approved by the Colorado School of Mines Board of Trustees*

The Colorado School of Mines feels that drug use poses a serious threat to the health and welfare of anyone involved in the use of illegal drugs, as well as a potential threat to the welfare of others within the campus community. This threat includes the possibility of lessening academic performance, estrangement of social relations, the creation of mental and physical problems, reckless, negligent or intentional physical or emotional harm to others, and in some cases, the possibility of bodily injury illness and death. Thus, the Colorado School of Mines position on drug use is that all students must comply with Colorado and Federal laws concerning the manufacture, possession, sale and use of drugs. In addition to facing criminal charges, students who fail to comply with these laws will be subject to appropriate campus disciplinary action, including probation, suspension or dismissal. As a part of the CSM disciplinary procedure, a student who has violated this policy and is allowed to remain in school will be required to submit to drug testing as a condition of continued enrollment.

The Colorado School of Mines offers, through the Office of Student Development and Academic Services, proactive alcohol and drug abuse programs designed to educate students to the dangers of substance abuse. These programs are supplemented by a newly added drug education component of the freshman general physical education course.

## **DRUG FREE SCHOOLS & COMMUNITIES ACT**

The Colorado School of Mines, in compliance with the federal government's Drug Free Schools & Communities Act, wants students to be aware of community standards and potential consequences pertaining to the illegal use of alcohol or drugs.

The University will impose sanctions on any student found to be in violation of campus standards as outlined in the CODE OF CONDUCT. Sanctions include, but are not limited to, requirements to complete an appropriate education or rehabilitation program, suspension or expulsion from the University, and/or referral to the appropriate authorities for prosecution.



The Student Development Center, the Health Center, Student Life Staff, and the Vice President for Student Life/Dean of Students Office will provide information or counseling in the physiological, psychological and legal aspects of alcohol use.

By Gubernatorial decree and in compliance with applicable laws, the illegal use of alcohol, other drugs, or controlled substances when on campus is prohibited.

In addition to the policy described above, education, training, and treatment programs are available through the Student Life Department and Colorado School of Mines Human Resources. The campus may take action when policies on the use, possession, distribution, manufacture, and sale of illegal drugs have been violated. CSM also cooperates with local, state and federal authorities in the detection and possession of drug offenses.

CSM alcohol policies apply to the Colorado School of Mines campus and institution-sponsored activities. Administrators, alumni, faculty, guests, staff and students must adhere to all applicable state and local laws and regulations related to the sale and use of alcoholic beverages. The most common laws related to alcohol use and sales are as follows:

The sale of alcoholic beverages is prohibited except in areas, at times, and on dates licensed by the Colorado State Department of Revenue.

Persons under 21 years of age cannot legally possess or consume alcoholic beverages of any kind. The furnishing of alcoholic beverages to under-aged persons is prohibited.

Alcohol cannot be consumed or carried in open containers on any street, sidewalk, alley, automobile, or public area (except as noted herein).

## **SERVING ALCOHOL**

Those persons or organizations that control the service of alcoholic beverages are responsible for compliance with applicable laws and campus policies. Those policies are:

Service of alcoholic beverages is planned to stop before the close of the event. The burden of proof for showing legal age is on the alcohol consumer. No alcohol will be served unless clear evidence of legal age is presented. It is the responsibility of those in charge of an event to ensure that no one who is under age is served or consumes any alcoholic beverages.

Alcohol may not be consumed or carried in open containers in common areas or "public" areas of any building or grounds except as follows: for group activities or events where a liquor license (if required) has been obtained and the scheduling officer has approved the event.

## **ILLEGAL DRUGS**

The policy for Colorado School of Mines and the institutions prohibit the sale, manufacture, distribution, use or possession of illegal drugs on the Colorado School of Mines Campus. This policy applies equally to administrators, faculty, staff, and students.

Sale, distribution or manufacturing of illegal drugs by a member of the Colorado School of Mines campus community will normally result in the administration taking action to curtail the activity. This policy applies within or upon the grounds, buildings, or any other facilities of the campus. Sanctions may be imposed upon individuals found in violation of these policies, as well as violation of laws controlling drugs and alcohol.

More specific and detailed information about Colorado School of Mines and institutional policies addressing drugs and alcohol concerns can be found in operations manuals, student handbooks, personnel offices or administrative policy information. Faculty, staff and students are encouraged to obtain this information through Student Life or the Colorado School of Mines Administrative office.

## **HEALTH RISKS**

Alcohol and other drugs have short- and long-term health effects depending on factors such as the type of drug, how often a person uses it, how much is used and the current physical and emotional condition of the person. Health risks include (but are not limited to):

- High blood pressure;

- Deterioration of the heart muscle;

- Loss of motor coordination, which can result in injury or death through automobile accidents, tripping, falling, or drowning;

- Injury or death through violence or self-destructive behavior;

- A depressed immune system.

Even infrequent use of drugs can result in such physical afflictions as hangovers, digestive tremors, impaired sexual response, cardiovascular damage and injuries due to lost coordination. Other possible effects include reduced alertness and impaired performance at school or work, interpersonal conflicts, and financial difficulties.

Alcohol and other drug use can also impair judgment, which could lead to uninformed and unhealthy decision about sex. This can increase the occurrence of unplanned pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV/AIDS. Even if contraceptives are used, they might not be used correctly because of the effects of the drug.



Of course, excessive use of certain drugs can have more immediate, severe physical consequences such as heart attack, respiratory arrest, coma and even death. Combining two or more drugs can also be extremely dangerous.

## **EDUCATION, COUNSELING AND REFERRALS FOR TREATMENT**

Information regarding the physiological and psychological effects of alcohol is also available through the Student Health Center, Student Life Staff, or Vice President of Student Life/Dean of Students Office.

The Engineers Choosing Healthy Options (ECHO) Program is the drug and alcohol education arm of the Office for Student Development and Academic Services. Over the years ECHO has acquired a substantial library of information on alcohol and other drugs that are readily available in the Office for Student Development and Academic Services, located in the Ben H. Parker Student Center, Suite 8.

Presentation programs are available to any campus group that makes a request. Referrals to the ECHO program are encouraged from all segments of the community.

Individuals who have problems beyond the educational scope are referred to appropriate agencies in the community for further assistance. All care provided off-campus is at the individual's own expense.

## **HAZING POLICY**

Colorado law governing all state institutions provides that "it shall be unlawful for any person to engage in any practice called 'hazing' or any acts of torturing, tormenting, or maltreating a fellow inmate, employee, or student." Students who thus interfere with the personal liberty of a fellow student are rendered liable to immediate discipline by the School and to such penalties as may be imposed by law.

## **SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATION INFORMATION**

Registered sex offenders who are students, employees, or volunteers for the Colorado School of Mines are required to advise their local law enforcement agency of their affiliation with any of the listed institutions. This information is forwarded to the Colorado Bureau of Investigation (CBI), and is available through at the Colorado School of Mines Police Department or Golden Police during normal business hours. The individual making the request will be provided with the list of registered sex offenders.

State and federal law require the release of information supplied by the Colorado Crime Information Center (CCIC) on registered sex offenders. The release of such information does not violate the Family Educational Rights to Privacy Act (FERPA).

In the event the Colorado School of Mines Police Records staff is unavailable to provide the requested information immediately, the name and phone number of the individual making the request will be taken and he/she will be notified when the report is available. All requests will be processed and made available for review within 72 hours of the request.

## **FIREARMS, EXPLOSIVES, AND OTHER WEAPONS**

Any type of gun, including BB and pellet guns, paintball guns, or any other device capable of launching a projectile, are not permitted on campus. Other weapons such as knives, picks, or axes are also not allowed. All weapons brought to campus must immediately be checked in at the Department of Public Safety for storage.

Explosives of any kind, including firecrackers or any other type of fireworks, and gunpowder, may not be used or stored on any property owned or operated by the school, unless it is for the explicit purpose of classroom or laboratory instruction and is under the direct supervision of a faculty member and with the consent of the Department of Public Safety.

Students are reminded that possession of a firearm or other deadly weapon on CSM property without permission is a violation of school policy, and in some cases, a violation of state law, and will be dealt with accordingly.



## ***FIREARM STORAGE PROCEDURES:***

1. All firearms / weapons will be stored at the CSM Department of Public Safety Office in the armory and all access will be controlled by the department.
2. Students who wish to access their firearms / weapons after hours must contact the Department of Public Safety during regular business hours and make advanced arrangements. The check in / checkout of firearms will be handled as soon as an officer becomes available.
3. All guns must be stored in a protective case. All rifles and shotguns must be stored in a soft protective case. The hard plastic cases take up a large amount of storage space, which limits the number of weapons that may be stored. Students are limited to the storage of three items.
4. All firearms must have the action cleared and the chamber and magazine empty prior to storage.
5. All weapons will be logged in and out. The information obtained will include the owner's name, and the make, model, and caliber of the weapons being stored. This information is obtained for identification purposes and not for any type of gun registration.
6. At the time of drop off or pick up, the person must have a positive form of identification in their possession.

## **DEFINITIONS OF REPORTED CRIMES**

The following definitions are crimes that Federal Law requires institutions to report:

***Arson:*** Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

***Criminal Homicide-Manslaughter by Negligence:*** The killing of another person through gross negligence.

***Criminal Homicide-Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter:*** The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

***Robbery:*** The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

***Aggravated Assault:*** An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied



by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

**Burglary:** The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

**Motor Vehicle Theft:** The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned including joyriding.)

**Sex Offenses-Forcible:** Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

*A. Forcible Rape-*The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

*B. Forcible Sodomy-*Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

*C. Sexual Assault With An Object-*The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

*D. Forcible Fondling-*The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

**Sex Offenses-Non-forcible:** Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.



**A. Incest**-Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

**B. Statutory Rape**-Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

Additionally, the following violations should be reported to CSM PD or to the appropriate institutional Judicial Affairs office. The police or judicial affairs staff will make tabulation of statistics from these referrals.

**Weapon Law Violations:** The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

**Drug Abuse Violations:** Violations of State and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

**Liquor Law Violations:** The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

**Hate Crimes:** Of the crimes described above, and any other crime involving bodily injury to any person in which the victim is intentionally selected because of the actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity or disability of the victim that are reported to campus security authorities or local police agency, the data shall be collected and reported according to category of prejudice.
